## NCCS Conference Keynote, **Dr. Ben Carson**

At the National Christ Child Society's Annual Conference on September 12–13, 2025, Dr. Ben Carson delivered a powerful keynote rooted in his own childhood story and the extraordinary influence of his mother.



When Ben was in third grade, his life changed dramatically. His mother discovered that her husband, a minister, had another family. With no formal education and little support, she bravely left and moved Ben and his brother, Curtis, first to relatives in Massachusetts and then to Detroit, where she worked two jobs to keep them afloat.

## National Christ Child Conference Highlights

### Opening day activities included

- Visits to the DC Chapter's Opportunity Shop, the National Mall, Smithsonian museums, and the Basilica of the National Shrine.
- Finance updates underscored the value of including CCS in estate planning and highlighted how even modest gifts can strengthen chapters for years to come.
- A special novena booklet was introduced to support the canonization cause of our founder, Mary Virginia Merrick, with encouragement for chapters to help share her story.
- Roundtable sessions grouped chapters by size to discuss effective strategies for membership growth, engagement, and retention.
- Reported service projects engaged 450 members, generated more than 1,400 volunteer hours, served 9,300 children and families, and welcomed 60 new members nationwide.

### Looking Ahead

- The 2026 NCCS Conference will be held September 10–12 in Dublin, Ohio.
- The 2027 Conference is planned for the newly renovated Bolger Center in Bethesda, Maryland.
- The conference was a meaningful reminder of the strength of our Christ Child community—united in service and inspired by our mission. †

## Mary Virginia Merrick's 11/02 Birthday Mass Intention

The Christ Child Society founder, Mary Virginia Merrick, was born in Washington, D.C., on November 2, 1866. One of the Santa Catalina Mass intentions for November 2, 2025, was offered in her honor. During the Mass, Pastor, Fr. Huy Vu recognized her as a Servant of God.

Canonization update from NCCS: Today, the "Archdiocesan" theological and historical phases are now nearing completion, after which her Cause will be sent to Rome for review by the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. If their findings are favorable, the documentation will be presented to the Holy Father, who may then declare Mary Virginia Merrick "Venerable."

Mary Virginia was a pioneer in American Catholic social reform. At the age of 20, following a serious fall that left her paralyzed and confined to her bed or a wheelchair, she responded to God's call to serve others. In 1887, she founded the Christ Child Society to provide care and assistance to needy infants, children, and families in the Washington, D.C. area.

In 2011, Archbishop Donald Cardinal Wuerl of Washington issued a decree officially opening the diocesan investigation for her Cause for Beatification and Canonization.

During her lifetime, Mary Virginia Merrick established 38 chapters of the Society. Today, more than 45 chapters across the United States continue her mission of love and service. †

## United in Service Event: Honoring Mary Virginia Merrick Through Hands-On Giving

## Celebrating Christmas Through Service

Continuing a beloved holiday tradition, CCST's Santa and his team have once again arrived on the Tucson school scene to deliver stockings filled with treasures this December. Their first stop was St. Ambrose Catholic School on December 5.

St. Ambrose Catholic School (SAS), located at 300 S. Tucson Blvd., serves preschool through 8th grade and offers a faith-centered, academically rich education. With roughly 270 students and a student-teacher ratio of about 16:1, the school blends strong academics with personal attention. Students benefit from a full curriculum that includes religion, music, PE, technology, and extracurriculars such as sports and mariachi. SAS strives to nurture students spiritually, intellectually, socially, and emotionally, preparing them for future success rooted in Catholic values.

Later that same day, Santa and his team visited Sam Hughes High School to deliver generously filled Christmas stockings to students in the TAP program.

TAP is a small, specialized public school serving pregnant teens and teen parents. It provides a safe, supportive, and nurturing environment that helps students complete their education while balancing their parenting responsibilities. TAP serves grades 6–12, though most participants are high school students.

Its mission is to help students thrive both academically and personally. The program promotes academic progress and college or career readiness through flexible scheduling, small class sizes, tutoring, and targeted credit recovery. TAP also cultivates a supportive community through mentoring, family engagement, support groups, and strong student-staff relationships.

The program further equips young parents by offering prenatal instruction, early-childhood courses, hands-on nursery experience, and health and nutrition guidance.

Ultimately, TAP prepares two generations for success—giving teen parents a real path to graduation and stability, while ensuring their children receive loving care and a strong start through early childhood education. †



Life in Detroit was tough. Their mother was often gone working long hours, and Ben struggled in school.

Teased and falling behind, he began to believe he wasn't capable of more—until the day he casually left his failing report card on the table. His mother refused to let that be his future. Turning to God for guidance, she created a new rule: each week the boys would read two library books and write a report.

Ben had never even been inside a library, but a librarian's simple question—"What interests you?"—opened a door. He began with books about animals and soon explored science, history, and beyond. As he read, his curiosity and confidence grew. The boy once dismissed as "dumb" eventually rose to the top of his class.

Dr. Carson later shared a poignant truth: his mother never learned to read. Yet she insisted on book reports, pretending to review them, because she knew reading would unlock a better life for her sons. Her faith, strength, and unwavering belief became their foundation.
